6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

The Vision of the University is, "Today we visualize the SNDT Women's University as a world class university that continually responds to the changing social realities through the development and application of knowledge. The purpose of such engagement will be to create an inclusive society that promotes and protects the dignity, equality, social justice and human rights for all, with special emphasis on empowerment of women."

"SNDT Women's University is committed to the cause of women's empowerment through access to education, particularly higher education, through relevant courses in the formal and non-formal streams. Further the university is committed to provide a wide range of professional and vocational courses for women to meet the changing socio-economic needs, with human values and purposeful social responsibility and to achieve excellence with "Quality in every Activity".

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The College has a well established on-line reporting system for MIS systems of the Office of the Director (Higher Education), Higher Education Department of the Central Government and the UGC. The College strictly completes the reporting of all these Higher Educational Bodies well in time. The College is covered under the *e-sevarth pranali* for the salary payment of its employees. It is using Uni-Suit Accounting System of the SNDT Women's University for recording, budgeting as well as for reporting.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The teaching faculty members of the College are actively involved in the Curriculum Development of the SNDT Women's University as the members of Syllabuses Revision Committees; and, are also the resource persons for the Content Development Workshops organised by the SNDT Women's University.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The College encourages the teaching faculty members to constantly upgrade their knowledge. It also tries to provide the students with all possible learning facilities. The teaching staff members as well as the students are encouraged to use innovative and interactive teaching-learning methods.

In order to facilitate the teachers to use technology the Computers are made available to individual Departments, in addition to common LCDs and Laptops.

- The self-study by the students was encouraged by adopting Innovative teaching methods such as study tours, study visits, Geo-Fest, Computer-Fest, exhibitions, internet related projects, surveys, short films, and power point presentations.
- The teaching staff members were deputed for Seminars and conferences organised by different academic bodies in Maharashtra.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

It is the policy of the College to make sure that the prevalent rules of minimum attendance, internal assessment, and the final examination are followed by the students. The College strictly adheres to the policy of timely examination and assessment schedules.

- As per the policy of the SNDT Women's University, the semester examinations for the first year B. A., B. Com., BCA, as well as the first and second B. C. A. were conducted by the College.
- Internal assignments in the form Case Study, Group Discussion, Presentation, etc., were given throughout the year.
- Majority of the permanent teaching staff members participated in the CAP of the University.

6.3.4 Research and Development

It is the policy of the College to encourage the teaching faculty members to undertake research activities for students by giving assignments related to the topics from the curriculum. The teaching faculty members are also deputed by the College to attend the research-related seminars, workshops, and orientations by sanctioning the duty leave.

- Almost all the permanent teaching faculty members attended and presented papers in the seminars of the State and National Levels.
- Four of the teaching staff members are the recognised guides for M. Phil. and Ph. D. programmes.
- One Consultancy Project of Floral Calendar and Mapping covering four States in India was undertaken for CBRTI, Pune.
- One Consultancy Project of developing Training Module for the NSDC-Accounts Executive Programme was undertaken for Continuing and Adult Education Department, Pune Sub-Centre of SNDT Women's University, Mumbai
- One teacher completed Eight-Week On-Line Open Source Course on Six Sigma Quality Certification offered by Technical University of Munich, Germany.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The branch library of the SNDT Women's University in the Pune Campus is well equipped with the books, journals, periodicals, and audio-visual study material, to cater for the needs of the teachers and the students. The College makes it compulsory to every student to take the membership of the library and encourages them to make its extensive use. A few departments also have their own departmental libraries of books.

The College has two Computer Laboratories with internet facility and every student is given the computer training. The Music, Psychology, Geography, and BVA Departments have separate laboratories and they are equipped with the required instruments. It is the policy of the College to keep all the labs updated. The College has sufficient grounds in the Campus for out-door sports activities and NCC parades.

Built in 1923, the building of the College is A Grade Heritage Building, accommodating administrative Offices, with adequate class rooms, wash rooms, and rest rooms for teachers and students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College endeavours to maintain a congenial environment with a view to allowing the academic and administrative staff members to perform their duties effectively and efficiently. Best possible use of available technology is done for timely and efficient communication with all the teaching and non-teaching staff members.

- Regular formal and informal meetings of the students' Council as well as the teaching and non-teaching staff members were convened with a view to getting their suggestions and for discussing their problems.
- The College has Anti-Ragging Committee, ICC, and Suggestion Box scheme for students.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The SNDT Women's University, being the Management of the College, recruits all the permanent teaching and non-teaching staff members, following the Government Rules. If any post remains vacant, it is filled by appointing staff on temporary basis so that regular functioning of the College does not get hampered.

After conducting the interviews through duly appointed Local Interview Committees and after getting the approval of the SNDT Women's University for filling vacant posts the appointments of the temporary staff were made on consolidated and clock hourly basis.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The College organises field visits of the students to different industrial units. It invites experts from the industry to deliver lectures and demonstrations to the students. The companies organised campus interviews and employability-skills workshops for the students. One teacher completed the floral mapping and calendar project of the CBRIT, Pune for four states in India. The ICICI Bank Ltd. organised Virtual stock Exchange Competition for the students of the Commerce faculty.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The College strictly follows all the rules of the Government and the University while admitting the students. Every eligible student who applies to the College is admitted on first-come-first-serve basis.

- The Admission Committee was formed as per the prescribed rules.
- On-Line Admission Portal of MKCL was used for admitting the students by the Administrative Staff of the College.
- The Academic Counselling for selecting appropriate faculty and the specialisation subject is provided to students seeking admission.

The College encourages the participation of students in various cultural and sports competitions bearing all the necessary expenses. The student can avail themselves of the travel concessions. Every student of the College was covered under the accident and hospitalisation insurance.


Summary Students' Feedback Report (2017-18)

In the academic year 2017-18, the College introduced revised students' feedback surveys to incorporate the new Students' Satisfaction Survey format laid down by the revised NAAC assessment guidelines. 





Best Practice 1

Centre for Entrepreneurial Learning- We, the Future Entrepreneurs

Background:

Maharshi Dhondo Keshav Karve formed SNDT Women's University and the College for women empowerment through education. Today we observe women are holding all the leading positions in the corporate world. At the grass root level also through SHGs (Self Help Groups) women are doing excellent job. It is the need of Young India to acquire the skill not only for seeking jobs but for starting their own businesses. Start ups is the buzz word and the solution for the problem of unemployment.

With this background and as per the recommendations of NAAC Peer Team, from the year 2015-16 the College has established a 'Centre for Entrepreneurial Learning- We, the Future Entrepreneurs'. Through this centre various activities will be conducted for developing knowledge, skill and attitude among our college students to become young entrepreneurs.

Motto of this centre:

Women Empowerment through Entrepreneur Skill Development

Objectives:

- 1) To develop skills, competence, and to motivate the young learners of the College to be future entrepreneurs.
- 2) To make the students aware about the recent trends in the field of entrepreneurship.
- 3) To give exposure and to provide them platform as budding entrepreneurs.

Plan of Action:

- 1) To form a group of interested students for the academic year.
- 2) To organise guest lecturers and visits for imparting required knowledge about entrepreneurial learning, procedure for starting a business, financial aspects, etc.
- 3) To conduct Entrepreneurship Development Programme (EDP).
- 4) To conduct surveys and projects for better understanding about recent trends.
- 5) To organise exhibition-cum-sale for giving practical exposure to the students.

Activities conducted in the year 2015-16:

1. A group of 22 students were initially enrolled for the centre. Ice-breaking session was conducted for getting information about their areas of interest as future entrepreneurs.

- 2. On 20 and 21 August, 2015 the centre organised Two Day Exhibition-cum-sale of Rakhis on the occasion of Rakhi Pournima to give practical exposure to the students.
- 3. Survey of Rakhi Business in Pune City:

To understand the nature of rakhi business in Pune city a survey was conducted using structured questionnaire. The students collected primary data from 125 respondents who were engaged in Rakhi business in retail market covering road side vendors and shop keepers to gold smiths selling rakhis.

A group of interested students from second year B. Com class are further working on the project. They are collecting information of e-business of Rakhies and try to understand utility of e-commerce.

- 4. On 10th October 2015 fifteen members of the centre attended One day Entrepreneurial Skill Development Programmeat Sakal International Learning Centre (SILC)
- 5. ThreeDay EDP was organised on 12, 15 and 16 February 2016 for imparting required knowledge about entrepreneurial learning, procedure for starting a business, financial aspects, role of women entrepreneurs, etc.

Activities conducted in the year 2017-18:

- 1. A lecture on 'Entrepreneurship opportunities and Challenges' by Ms. Preeti Bhatia (Roots) was organised on 4th August 2017. 55 students participated in the programme.
- 2. An interview of Mrs. Sheetal Oak, a well-known fashion designer in Pune and alumni of this College, was organised on 4th October 2017. A short film on her journey as a fashion designer was screened. 127 students participated in the programme.
- 3. A three day add-on-course 'Entrepreneurship Awareness Programme' was organised in collaboration with Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (MCED, GoM), on 19th, 21st and 22nd December 2017. 111 students participated in this programme. Various women entrepreneurs shared their experiences and discussed entrepreneurship as a career option with the students. Three students of this College took inspiration from the programme and prepared perfumes and sold around 200 bottles to customers at reasonable prices in less than two months. They could earn sumptuous profit through this business. The set an example of entrepreneurship before their friends.
- 4. Screening of a film on JRD Tata followed by a discussion was organised on 6th February 2018. Mr. Abhay Deodhar, Management Consultant, described the journey of JRD Tata as a successful entrepreneur and his contribution as to socio-economic development of India. 93 students participated in this programme.
- 5. An exhibition on leading industrialists and businessmen in India titled 'Charioteers of Indian Industry' was organised on 7th February 2018. 20 students participated in the exhibition. 110 visitors could get information about 18 leading industrialists in India. The exhibition was also taken to Premleela Vitthaldas Kanyashala, Narayan Peth, Pene as an extension activity of the College.

Outcome:

The activity is inspiring the girl students to become an entrepreneur and start a small business to stand on their own feet. There are notable examples of our students who start their own small business after graduation.

Best Practice 2

Add-on Courses to develop employability skills in collaboration with Corporate Sector

The Context:

In the new globalization era, to make the current Indian Higher Education System more relevant and career-oriented with focus on quality and excellence, UGC has encouraged incorporation of skill oriented and value added, add-on courses in Colleges/Universities.

It is envisaged that professionally qualified graduates with a sound knowledge of their core disciplines and expertise in a concerned skill will have more openings in service, industry and self-employment sectors. Demand and scope for such professionally trained graduates are visible in the applied fields of almost all basic/core disciplines and faculties in the current changing global scenario and is likely to increase in the future. Hence, the IQAC of the College, in consultancy with the experts, thought of starting a relevant add on course to be opted by students as a parallel sub-discipline while pursuing their B. A. or B. Com. Degree level education.

The Objective:

- To introduce career and market oriented, skill enhancing add-on course that has utility for job, self employment and empowerment of the students.
- To bridge the gap between industry and academics.
- Along with conventional degree in Arts or Commerce, the students will be equipped with a certificate in an add-on course.
- To provide employability skills to the students, belonging to the lower and lower middle income strata, in affordable fees or free of cost.

The Practice:

- It was decided to give a course on Tally ERP as an add-on course to the students of B. A. and B. Com. Degree Programmes in year 2014-15. Tally ERP is the largest accounting package. It has grown from basic to mature business management product. Tally ERP 9 is the most famous software which is more adaptable and can be customized despite the nature of markets. It provides complete work such as accounting, payroll, finance, sales, purchase, etc. It is designed to meet the developing demand of the businesses in different domains.
- The IQAC found that many students from the Commerce faculty wanted to learn the Tally ERP; however the cost of the course provided by the private institutions was too high for them. So, it was decided to make the course available in affordable charges.

- The senior Associate Professor of Accountancy was the Coordinator of the course, and was responsible for the academic and administrative aspects of the course.
- Teaching faculty specialized in this particular software was appointed in collaboration with CCA, Pune.
- A 45 day Add-on course was framed which included classroom lectures along with laboratory practical and practice sessions.
- 45 students completed the course successfully by giving on-line examination.

Detail of add on courses in the year 2015-16

The Department of Commerce organized 45 Day Add on Certificate Course on TALLY ERP, during 8 Feb to 15 March 2016. 53 students registered for the course and successfully completed the same. The course was conducted by the trained faculties of College of Computer Accountants, Pune.

Details of add on courses in the year 2016-17

- In this year, the Department carried out three Add-on courses. The first one was on Employability Skill Training Workshop in collaboration with Barclays Company, Global Talent Tracks, Pune from 22 August 2016 to 2 September 2016. 111 students completed this course.
- Second Add-on course was TATA Strive Course for Employability Skills for Banking and Finance Sector by TATA Community Initiatives Trust from 13 December 2016 to 18 February 2017. Total training hours for this course were 240 (4 hrs. per day). 70 students enrolled for this course of which 41 successfully completed the course. This course was sponsored by Cipla Foundation, Mumbai. The Certificate Ceremony was organized on 30 June 2017 in the presence of officials from Cipla Foundation and Tata Strives.
- Third Add-on course on Soft Skill Development Programme was organized for students from B. Com. II and BAF I class. Dr. Archana Vechalekar conducted eight sessions of two hours during 20 January to 31 January, 2017. Seventy students attended the programme. Orientation was given on soft skills like Reading and Writing Skill, Group Communication, Group Discussion, Mock Interview, Team Building, etc.
- An Add-on Course titled "Brain Gymnasium", based on Yoga and Meditation was conducted for teaching faculty, administrative faculty and students. It was a 45 session's programme from26th July 2016 to 11th April 2017. The sessions were arranged in two days per week. 16 teaching staff, 2 administrative staff and 33 students were enrolled for the course. This activity was very fruitful for 'Overall Development of Mind and Body'. Along with demonstrations the explanation with scientific background by the trainer helped the participants to understand importance of different Yoga Mudras. The course covered techniques from Omkar to Shavasana for flexibility of body and control on breathing. Along with meditation, sharing on Good Habits, Challenging Oneself, Attitude of Gratitude, Socialization were helpful for Self Development and for Being Human.

Details of add on courses in the year 2017-18

- A value added course on 'Law relating to Rights of Women' was organised for B. Com. Students. Dr. Advocate Pratapsinh Salunke was the resource person for this 10 hours/seven Day short course. 75 students benefited from this course.
- 'GST as a Career Opportunity' was a value added course organised in collaboration with Hope Career Academy. 63 students benefited from this 30 day programme.
- A three day (15 hours) add-on-course 'Entrepreneurship Awareness Programme' was organised in collaboration with Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (MCED, GoM), on 19th, 21st and 22nd December 2017. 111 students participated in this programme. Various women entrepreneurs shared their experiences and discussed entrepreneurship as a career option with the students. Three students of this College took inspiration from the programme and prepared perfumes and sold around 200 bottles to customers at reasonable prices in less than two months. They could earn sumptuous profit through this business. The set an example of entrepreneurship before their friends.
- Department of Visual Arts organised workshops on paper bags making, serigraphy, warli painting, terracotta, rapid sketching, etc. The workshops were of time duration of three to four days each. Eminent professionals gave guidance to the participants.
- ICICI Foundation organised orientation as skill development programme and provided on job training to the students for 3 months. 9 students registered and completed the foundation course.
- 'A spoken English Accelerator Programme: Basic Course' was conducted in collaboration with Innovative Apps Pvt. Ltd., New Delhi from 9th February to 1st March 2018. 13 students benefited from the programme. The students prepared and presented a play on benefits of the programme on stage.
- A web development and designing short course, 'Photoshop C. S. 6 and Coral Draw' was conducted for BCA students from 3rd February to 20th February 2018. 20 students participated in the programme. Ms. Ketaki Joshi, a past student of this college was the resource person for this programme.
- MSDE, Maharashtra Skill Development Centre, Pune offered employability skills development programme to the students of this College during April and May 2018. 55 students participated in these programmes.

4. Obstacles faced/ Problems encountered

The College runs its regular five degree programmes as well as the Junior College from 7.30 am to 5.30 pm. We find shortage of the number of classrooms, computers in the computer labs. It is also difficult to find the suitable timings to run the add-on courses.

5. Evidence of Success

- Students not only get trained by professionals but also get hands-on experience. It supplements what students are learning in the core programme.
- It is observed that the communication skill, writing skills were improved.
- The confidence level of students is raised.
